
In conclusion, the 2023 Inter-Club Competition was a resounding success, uniting clubs from all over New

EYE HEALTH FOR YOUR DOG

Being aware of your dog's eye health is important to provide support and health care to manage or slow eye diseases.

Diet

The correct diet is essential, feeding them a high moisture, meat-based diet rich in naturally occurring antioxidants / carotenoids which help to lower inflammation. Such as blueberries, broccoli, eggs, carrots, cold water fish (sardines, cod, tuna and salmon), kale, pumpkin and sweet potato. Supplements may help such as Omega 3 essential fatty acids found in krill, sardines or anchovies will cross the blood-brain barrier to nourish the eyes. Other vitamins and antioxidants that support eye health include Vitamin E and C.and lutein and turmeric. Much as what humans need. Think about sharing the above veggies and food in your dog's dinner!

Check

At the club we promote a daily check of your dog - this should include looking in their eyes to check for changes such as holding the eye(s) closed or half closed, tearing, redness, discharge, or pawing at the eye(s). There should not be any build-up of discharge that requires regular cleaning.

A visit to the veterinarian is essential to manage the following issues :

Red eyes signify inflammation. Engorged blood vessels tell you that blood is being rushed to the eye to bring oxygen and nutrients to help fight disease. Red eyes can signal such problems as Keratoconjunctivitis sicca (KCS, or

dry eye), "cherry" eye (a visible tear gland), glaucoma, entropion (eyelids rolled in, rubbing on the cornea), and ectropion (droopy eye lids).

Rubbing, squinting and light sensitivity can be caused by itchy eyes, painful eyes, foreign bodies, tumours, increased pressure in the eye, or an eye injury or eyelids or eyelashes growing int he wrong direction.

Excessive tearing can occur as a result of allergies, pain from corneal ulcers, foreign bodies, or increased pressure. Blocked tear ducts may also result in excess tears spilling over onto the face.

Green, yellow, or mucoid discharge indicates an infection. Mucous will be produced when there are not enough tears, or the eye is dry.

Bulging eye(s) is a sign of high pressure within the globe of the eye. The high pressure can be caused by glaucoma or a tumour behind the eye or on the surface of the eye or eyelid. Bulging eyes can also signal an injury. If not treated quickly, these conditions can quickly cause blindness.

















Cloudy eyes indicate swelling in the cornea which indicates. there has been damage to the cornea. Cataracts appear as a white opaque filling of the lens which block transmission of light and cause blindness. Cataracts can occur at any age.

Dilated or unequal pupils can be

diagnosed by placing a bright light in front of your pet. If the pupils do not constrict in bright light, this is an indication that vision is being lost. This can be secondary to hypertension (heart or kidney disease, or inflammation like SARDS (Sudden Acquired Retinol Degeneration Syndrome) or PRA (Progressive Retinol Atrophy). Unequal pupil sizes can be an indication of an eye problem or a neurologic problem and should be checked as soon as possible.

Confusion, or bumping into

things shows that your pet is having trouble finding their way around. Blindness can be an indication of a more serious disease, like lymphoma.

An elevated (or visible) third

eyelid indicates inflammation where the eye is trying to protect itself. See your vet immediately.

Genetic Predispositions

It is a good idea to research genetic predispositions to eye disease in your dog. Talk to the breeder certain breeds are prone to certain eye problems.

Eye problems should not wait days to be seen. Insist on an immediate appointment or take your pet to an emergency clinic.

Ground Rules

1. As a condition of membership, all dogs are required to be properly vaccinated according to current veterinary guidelines.

2. Members are responsible at all times for the behaviour of their dog/s whilst present on the training grounds or representing the club.

3. All dogs must have properly fitted equipment and remain on lead at all times (unless instructed otherwise by a club instructor). No check/ choker chains are to be used on any dogs in Puppy, Beginners or Graduate classes.

4. A member shall not ill-treat a dog at any time. Any such action may give rise to suspension or expulsion from the Club by resolution of the Committee.

5. Bitches in season and/or dog/s which are unwell or have an infectious condition are not permitted on the obedience training grounds.

6. Members are to pick up after their dog/s and help keep the grounds clean and tidy.

7. Adequate sensible dress with appropriate footwear (no thongs, scuffs or bare feet) is required to be worn by handler during training.

8. Dogs are not to be left unattended whilst on the training grounds unless crated or tethered in a safe area. Members are reminded not to approach dogs that are confined. All dogs are to be kept under control and supervised while at the counter or in the clubhouse.

9. The Club reserves the right to ask any member to muzzle or in extreme cases, remove their dog/s from the training grounds. If a muzzle is required this must remain in place whilst on the club grounds. This will be at the discretion of the Committee.
