K9 Companion Award

An Assessment for Club Members only

This Award is open to members with dogs in Class 8 or above

Assessments will be held: Monday 20th November 2023 starting from 7.15pm Tuesday 21st November 2023 starting from 10.45am

The following elements are essential to undertake the test:

- Dogs must be at least 12 months of age. They must have completed our Beginners Course or be in Class 8 (or higher) of the Club's Course.
- Proof of Council registration, microchipping and a current vaccination or equivalent certificate.
- The dog should be presented in a clean and tidy manner.
- The dog should be fitted with an appropriate collar or restraint for that dog (i.e., collar, gentle collar, head collar and harness), and be on a leash. **No check chains** are to be used.
- The Handler must carry a plastic bag at all times to clean up after his/her dog.
- Training treats are not to be given during exercises. Verbal praise is, however, permitted.
- The Handler may offer food rewards at the finish of each individual exercise.
- A number of both verbal and hand cues are permitted during exercises.
- The Handler must have an 80% pass rate on the theory assessment and 100% on the practical assessment.
- If you do not achieve 100% in your practical assessment, you will be able to re-sit the practical test without charge when the next K9 Assessments are held.
- The cost of the assessment is \$20.00.
- For full details of the Award and information on exercises talk with your Class Instructor.
- Please obtain an application form at the office, and submit it with your \$20 fee <u>at least 2</u> <u>weeks prior</u> to the test date.
- Once you have paid you will be given your test booklet with all the practical exercises listed and explained, plus your homework questionnaire.
- To allow time for marking, your written homework <u>must</u> be submitted at the Office <u>at least 1 week</u> prior to the practical test.

DO YOU HAVE A SAFE BACKYARD?

AS the days grow longer and warmer our pets are more likely to enjoy their outdoor space more, so it is time to do a backyard audit!

Necessities

Covered shaded space throughout the day.

Access to water - a large bowl that cannot be tipped over or one that flls automatically.

Food bowl

Safe fences and this includes around the pool, spa even if your pet can swim - they can get into dif culty and become tired if they can't get out of the pool

Working and lockable gates

Clear away sticks - some dogs can chew on these and end up with splinters and puncturing of their mouth

Clean areas - pick up excrement daily and dispose to avoid parasites.

Ensure pool chemicals, gardening sprays and snail bait are locked away to ensure accidental poisoning does not occur.

Outdoor enrichment

To prevent anxiety have a fun outdoor area. Is your backyard fun?

Toys of dif erent sizes indestructible, safe (not tennis balls, sticks or artificial toys that can be eaten)

Kongs can be hidden in the garden with food inside to encourage searching

Roll up a towel with kibble inside and hide

Put toys in a cardboard box

Hide food in tyres etc

You could leave a snuf e mat outside



Must dos

Some plants can be toxic - make sure you check these a list can be found on <u>https://pets4life.com.au/dogs-and-toxic-plants-in-australia-list/</u> and some of these may absolutely surprise you.

Other plants can cause skin irritations such as Ivy.

Lillies and bay laurels can cause stomach aches, sago palms and bamboo can induce vomiting.

Avoid bulbs such as daf odils and tulips that can be poisonous as well as azaleas.

Talk to your garden centre - there may be substitute plants that look the same however are not toxic.

Ensure bins cannot be tipped over

If your dog happens to bark at people going by perhaps block of their site or access to the gate.

Ensure that dogs cannot jump on things that can then get them over the fence - eg tables, bins, chairs, boxes.

BBQs smell so good to dogs - make sure these are cleaned and dogs cannot pull things down on themselves or get to rank food, old bones or skewers.

Tables and chairs - check the table to see that there is nothing on there that could be considered dangerous, that they can't pull the tablecloth.

Small dogs can be attacked by birds or wild cats depending on where you live so always ensure there is a place they can go to hide.

If you have had a party or have small children check that there are no balloons, toys or other items that the dog can ingest, cause chocking or illness.



Luxuries

Camera to check on your dog throughout the day

Hire a Dog Nanny to come and play while you are away.

Self feeder

A doggy door to allow the dog to go in and out of the house - some of these can be operated by a reader on the dogs collar that will open the dog door, and for renters you may be able to get a door panel from the hardware store that has a doggie door that f ts and is lockable that f ts in a sliding glass door.

Not a good idea to leave a dog with a bone these can be problematic - best to save uncooked soft bones until you can supervise.



BAWA is a registered non-profit organisation whose aim is to help, rescue, rehabilitate and rehome animals in

BAWA's tireless and sometimes heartbreaking work takes place within a culture whose first priority is rarely non-human animals. In contrast with Australia, Indonesian dogs seldom enjoy the privileged position of being loved family members.

Ground Rules

1. As a condition of membership, all dogs are required to be properly vaccinated according to current veterinary guidelines.

2. Members are responsible at all times for the behaviour of their dog/s whilst present on the training grounds or representing the club.

3. All dogs must have properly fitted equipment and remain on lead at all times (unless instructed otherwise by a club instructor). No check/ choker chains are to be used on any dogs in Puppy, Beginners or Graduate classes.

4. A member shall not ill-treat a dog at any time. Any such action may give rise to suspension or expulsion from the Club by resolution of the Committee.

5. Bitches in season and/or dog/s which are unwell or have an condition infectious are not permitted on the obedience training grounds.

6. Members are to pick up after their dog/s and help keep the grounds clean and tidy.

7. Adequate sensible dress with appropriate footwear (no thongs, scuffs or bare feet) is required to be worn by handler during training.

8. Dogs are not to be left unattended whilst on the training grounds unless crated or tethered in a safe area. Members are reminded not to approach dogs that are confined. All dogs are to be kept under control and supervised while at the counter or in the clubhouse.

9. The Club reserves the right to ask any member to muzzle or in extreme cases, remove their dog/s from the training grounds. If a muzzle is required this must remain in place whilst on the club grounds. This will be at the discretion of the Committee.

10. Members who use Club equipment must ensure it is returned to the storeroom and stored correctly after classes are

11. Child Children are welcome to attend classes provided they are supervised by an adult/parent/ guardian at all times.

12. Child members (aged 7 to 11 are to be accompanied by an adult/ parent/guardian in classes) and Junior members (aged 12 to 15 under adult/parent/quardian on supervision grounds) are welcome to train providing they have sufficient control of their dog during classes. This will be at the discretion of the class/chief instructor.

13. The Club is in operation if the dog building doors and roller shutter are open. ie: from 5:45 Mondays and from 10:00 am Tuesdays
