

MY DOG TRAINING JOURNEY

Kathy Cocks - August 2022

I first joined Hills Dog Club in 1988 when we brought home a Lab/Kelpie X from the Animal Welfare League at Kemps Creek. She came to us 6 months after our young Kelpie had been run over by a car out the front of our house and at the time I didn't know if I could look at another dog. The family convinced me that I needed a dog, and it wasn't long before we joined up at Hills. Her name was Tina. She was around 1 or 2 years old when she came to us, and she died in my arms at 16. We didn't last long at Hills because of what I considered harsh training methods. I was really uncomfortable with the check chain, but we persevered in the classes, moving from 1st Class to 2nd and finishing with 3rd Class. That's all there was in those days. After that you went on to trial. I was never interested in any dog sports as all I wanted was just a good family dog. We had that with Tina in spades. She was wonderful and was well and truly my "heart" dog who passed in my arms at 16.

18 months after Tina's passing, I found Charley at Monica's Doggie Rescue at Terry Hills. Charley was the most fearful little dog I think I had ever seen, and I simply couldn't leave him there. He was 12 months old and was the dog in the back corner, cowering from all the other little dogs. He was a Chihuahua X (we later had reason to believe that he was crossed with a Schipperke). So once again I joined up at Hills. This was 2003 and thankfully times had changed. I didn't know who was running the Club at the time. All I wanted was to figure out my new little boy.

Within 12 months the Club was conducting an Instructors' Course and in February 2004 I commenced my training. It really did open up a wonderful world to me and I will never forget the time I spent learning and meeting new friends. Thanks to the course I was finally able to figure out what was going on with Charley and we started to make real progress. In November 2006 the Club conducted the Delta Canine Good Citizen test and Charley and I passed!

Eventually, I heard about the Delta volunteers and felt that Charley would be really good at cheering folk up. It was Tom Wilson who assessed us as a Delta team, and we passed the assessment with flying colours. Our first job was at the Westmead Children's Hospital in 2007. Charley was approximately 5 years old. He loved his visits and would prance along the corridors to the next bed, and the next. He soon became a favourite of the nurses as he worked his magic on the children. Later in 2007 we commenced visits to IDS in Castle Hill. This was a facility for the mild to medium intellectually impaired folk. Charley really loved his visits there and would happily sit on knees and be taken for walks up and down the corridor. We kept visiting them for 4 years until I felt it was time to retire him. Charley turned out to be the most wonderful family dog and was a lifetime companion who passed away in my arms at the age of 17, which was not bad for a dog who was rescued by Monica's Doggie Rescue one day before he was due to be euthanised at 9 months of age. I have Hills Dog Club and all the education and opportunities to thank for helping Charley to achieve his best outcome.




On 18 March 2006 our family expanded when Bella came to join us. She was 11 months old and had been at the Club a couple of times. The person who had brought her along told Dianne that he was taking her to the pound. That very night we also had the President of the Border Collie Rescue Club visiting and she and Dianne thought this young (11-month-old) Border Collie could be rehomed very quickly without going to the pound. Dianne called me out of my class I was taking and watched the dog with me. I exchanged details and by Saturday Bella came to our home. It turned out that the lady who had bought Bella off the (back yard) breeder got cancer when Bella was 7 months old, and the poor dog was passed along to different people in a known circle. By the time I got her she had been in 4 homes at 11 months! She was confused, anxious, and had a lot of issues. Thanks to Hills she became a wonderful family dog, and I was able to learn about competition obedience with her. In her first ever Novice trial she came first, and I still have the lovely dish that we won. Unfortunately, it turned out that she was an extremely inquisitive dog and needed to check everything out around her which resulted in a lot of running out of rings! It wasn't until I learnt to redirect her back to me through teaching tugging that we started to have success. She really was a steep learning curve.

Bella and I also went to tracking training and had a lot of fun. She was a truly great companion and lived a long and happy life, passing away in my arms in October 2021 at the grand age of 16-1/2. She will never be forgotten.

In November 2012 we welcomed yet another dog to the family, this time an 8-week-old Flat Coated Retriever puppy called Marco. So now we were a family of 3 dogs! Marco took me to a world of retrieving and that remains my favourite dog sport today, as well as the Flat Coated Retriever remaining my favourite breed. We competed in RATG (Retrieving Ability Test for Gundogs) and at our first Novice RATG we came first. 10 It was very exciting! I also learned about the Show World with Marco as I entered him in Shows and by 13 months of age, he had his Champion Title. 9 It was thanks to Pauline Hartwell and her show training that we had some success. Marco and I also competed in Rally O 11 and trained for Obedience. While he was a lovely working dog, my preference remained retrieving and we spent most of our time working out in the field. He was my second dog to achieve the Endurance Test title. 12 He also successfully gained the Club's K9 Certificate 13 He sadly passed away just 4 weeks after Bella with an aggressive tumour in the lung at 9 years 1 month. It was a shock, and I didn't believe I could take on another dog after losing 2 so closely together.



BLOAT OR GASTRIC DILATATION & VOLVULUS

Gastric dilatation-volvulus (GDV) or gastric dilatation is a serious condition and is fatal if left untreated. Commonly referred to as "bloat," GDV occurs when a dog's stomach fills with gas, food, or fluid and subsequently twists.


GD and GDV develops without warning and can progress quickly. It is always an emergency. Both can cause shock because the distended, gas-filled stomach obstructs blood flow. Gastric dilatation can be relieved by pumping the stomach, but GDV requires emergency surgery to untwist the stomach and save the dog's life.

What are the symptoms of bloat in dogs?

- A swollen, hard belly.
- Retching but not able to vomit.
- Drooling.
- Pain in the abdomen when touched.
- Other signs of distress such as panting and restlessness.

Causes of bloat

- Eating very quickly, too much food.
- Overeating
- Drinking a large quantity of water in a short period of time
- Raised food bowls
- Stress (anxious dogs are thought to be more prone, as are dogs in stressful situations or environments such as boarding kennels)
- Exercising after eating, too much exercise
- Genetic factors
- Increased age
- Hot food, cold food
- Big kibble, little kibble

In addition, too many carbohydrates, and stress have all been said to cause bloat however remain unsubstantiated. Scientific studies have shown that breed is a risk factor - Large and giant breed dogs with deep chests and narrow waists.

A higher incidence occurs where siblings or littermates have had bloat. The risk also increases of bloat as a dog ages. One study showed the presence of a foreign object in the stomach predisposed dogs to bloat.

Nervous dogs, food gulpers and dogs fed once daily also may have an increased likelihood of bloat.

How to prevent bloat?

If you have a large or giant breed dog:

Discuss prophylactic Gastropexy with your veterinarian. It may be recommended that these dogs have their stomachs tacked in place at time of spaying. This surgery can be done using minimally invasive techniques. However this surgery does not prevent gastric dilatation, but has been determined to be costeffective in preventing GDV.

- Dog owners must always monitor their dog for abdominal distension and non productive retching, which are two of the common signs of bloat.
- Divide food and feed twice a day.
- Buy a feeding toy or a bowl that prevents gulping food.
- Be sure your dog gets daily exercise and maintains a healthy body weight. Daily moderate exercise decreases the likelihood of suffering with bloat.

Ground Rules

- 1. As a condition of membership, all dogs are required to be properly vaccinated according to current veterinary guidelines.
- 2. Members are responsible at all times for the behaviour of their dog/s whilst present on the training grounds or representing the club.
- 3. All dogs must have properly fitted equipment and remain on lead at all times (unless instructed otherwise by a club instructor). No check/choker chains are to be used on any dogs in Puppy, Beginners or Graduate classes.
- 4. A member shall not ill-treat a dog at any time. Any such action may give rise to suspension or expulsion from the Club by resolution of the Committee.
- 5. Bitches in season and/or dog/s which are unwell or have an infectious condition are not permitted on the obedience training grounds.

- 6. Members are to pick up after their dog/s and help keep the grounds clean and tidy.
- 7. Adequate sensible dress with appropriate footwear (no thongs, scuffs or bare feet) is required to be worn by handler during training.
- 8. Dogs are not to be left unattended whilst on the training grounds unless crated or tethered in a safe area. Members are reminded not to approach dogs that are confined. All dogs are to be kept under control and supervised while at the counter or in the clubhouse.
- 9. The Club reserves the right to ask any member to muzzle or in extreme cases, remove their dog/s from the training grounds. If a muzzle is required this must remain in place whilst on the club grounds. This will be at the discretion of the Committee.
- 10. Members who use Club equipment must ensure it is

returned to the storeroom and stored correctly after classes are conducted.

11. Children are welcome to attend classes provided they are supervised by an adult/parent/guardian at all times.

12. Child members (aged 7 to 11 are to be accompanied by an adult/parent/guardian in classes) and Junior members (aged 12 to 15 under adult/parent/guardian supervision on grounds) are welcome to train providing they have sufficient control of their dog during classes. This will be at the discretion of the class/chief instructor.


LIVING WITH COVID AT HILLS DOG CLUB 2022
